

STORIES OF IMPACT

FBI Recognizes Fatima Family Center

Partnering with local law enforcement to promote safety and improve relationships has always been a priority at Fatima Family Center, located in Cleveland's historic Hough neighborhood. In April 2018, the FBI recognized Fatima with the Director's Community Leadership Award for its efforts in "combating crime, terrorism, drugs, and violence in America."


The center has an extraordinary relationship with the officers in Cleveland's Third District. Officers visit the center frequently to interact with residents, including children. They provide educational sessions about personal, community, and cybersecurity. Officers often volunteer at the many events Fatima hosts, such as Toyland Joyland, the annual Christmas event for families. Fatima also hosts the police officers' recruiting class each year.

Early Learning & Head Start Success

Catholic Charities Early Learning Program has a rich history of providing services to families and children in Cuyahoga County. All of the eight early learning centers are rated 5-Star through Step Up To Quality, Ohio's tiered quality rating system. In 2018, the Early Learning Program increased enrollment to 98.6%. We attribute this success to the hardworking individuals who are part of the Early Learning and Head Start Program and Catholic Charities' integration and increase of digital marketing efforts. For example, in early fall of 2018, Catholic Charities introduced a Google display ad campaign and increased traffic to the early learning website by 73 percent, which ultimately helped increase enrollment in the program.

In 2018, Matt Talbot for Men and for Women served 2,180 individuals.


Ryan started drinking before he was 10-years-old.

He realized he needed help after he was fired from his job because of his drinking. During that time he said he drank a liter of whiskey every day.

When he was referred to Matt Talbot, he was determined to learn as much as he could about his disease and the recovery process. Ryan admits that the first weeks of recovery were tough as he detoxed from more than 20 years of drinking. He listened to the suggestions by staff and participated in all the steps of recovery, including intensive outpatient services. He worked hard. He knew he had to change.

He shared that one of the hardest parts of the program was watching a few younger, good friends he met in recovery, pass away from the disease. In their memory, and to give back to the program, Ryan visits Matt Talbot often and participates in group counseling sessions. He attends Alcoholic Anonymous meetings five days a week. He is a founding member of the Matt Talbot Alumni group, which comes together to support both former and new clients in the program. Ryan wants others to learn from his experience, but admits he still has a lot to learn about the disease and recovery.

Ryan's former employer gave him another chance after he told them about his efforts to become sober, which took almost a year. Since then he's earned back the company's trust. "It feels good to be responsible again," Ryan said, and he knows he has Matt Talbot to thank. The staff taught him coping skills, how to take one day at a time and much more. Ryan said he'll never forget Matt Talbot. "I owe my life to the program."


Each has experienced torture – physical, emotional, or both – in their native countries. When they arrived in Cleveland each of them sought help from Catholic Charities Migration & Refugee Services (MRS). MRS helped them through the Ohio Center for Survivors of Torture (OCST), which MRS has operated since 2015. Here these men, along with their families, are recovering from the torture they experienced.

With current funding through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Refugee Resettlement and the United Nation's Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture, OCST provides free, holistic services to anyone, immigrant or citizen, who survived torture abroad. Our experienced and credentialed multi-disciplinary team provides legal, medical, mental health, social and spiritual support. OCST expanded capacity through a grant from the Cleveland Foundation in 2017 and is currently the only torture treatment center in the state of Ohio.

Chol G. (C.G.), a member of the Dinka ethnic group, experienced all of this – and survived. When he visited Ohio to attend baseball camp, he sought asylum. With the help of Catholic Charities and our MRS staff, he completed an application for and was granted asylum. He currently attends high school and plans to attend college next year. MRS also currently represents Jonas N. (J.N.). J.N., is a young man from the Democratic Republic of Congo where he was a political activist. There he was beaten, arrested and tortured by Congolese security forces. J.N. came to the United States to seek asylum and was immediately detained. He has been held in an immigration detention facility in Youngstown since July 2018.

Years ago, the MRS Immigration Legal Services (ILS) helped Jose C. (J.C.) get work permission through Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA). Since then, he has worked in restaurants and is currently an executive chef in the Cleveland area. Married with three children, MRS is helping him attain permanent green card status, so he can live free of the violence that he and his mother escaped years ago.


Financial Highlights


